

CLOSET SHELVING · JOB PLANNING

Counting Closets

We price closet labor by the piece, sorted into tiers. Tag every shelf, rod, and bulkhead by its tier and you have the count before you pick up a tool.

The three tiers

Tier 1 · T1	A basic closet piece - a shelf, rod, or bulkhead. Standard labor rate.
Tier 2 · T2	A shelf that takes extra work: an added bracket, scribed (traced and cut to follow an uneven wall) down to a narrower depth, or cut to fit an angled wall. A rod stays T1 even with two brackets - only shelves bump up to T2. T2 carries its own set rate for the added work.
Face frame · FF	Built-in, sanded, cabinet-look shelving instead of bullnose - the pretty version. Each face-frame piece is its own set rate, about double its matching standard tier (T1-FF, T2-FF).

Worked examples



Reach-in pantry

Five-shelf stack, one wall

T1 ×5



Bedroom reach-in

Double + single hang, center stack

T1 ×14



L-shaped pantry

Shelf runs on two walls

T1 ×5

T2 ×5



Walk-in

Rod & shelf on two walls

T1 ×6

T2 ×2



Built-in pantry

Face frame, both walls

T1-FF ×17

T2-FF ×11
